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Looking Ahead to Forum 2016

Mark your calendars – SOK Forum - May 6th to May 8th, 2016.

Planning for the next year's Forum begins as we are clearing away the tables from the current Forum. So, while there are many decisions yet to be made and many details to be worked out, some broad directions have been established for Forum 2016.

The success of The Great Arc focus for 2015 has inspired the Board to build on this theme and to continue to explore our relationship with our friends on the Door Peninsula. In 2016, we will tackle the general theme of "the peoples of the Great Arc" and investigate such topics as early human occupation of the area following glaciation, use of the land, trade connections, and how human use of the Arc has had ecological consequences. In a sense, we will be exploring the ecological history of the area framed by the Bruce and Door Peninsulas.

Developing topics related to the peoples of the Great Arc will allow us to connect in concrete ways ideas about geology and geologic forces that we considered this past May.

The focus for Forum 2017 will be to look to the human and ecological future for the Great Arc.


Great Arc Geopark Facebook Page

A Note from Josie Mielhausen

My name is Josie Mielhausen and I have had the honor of receiving the Sources of Knowledge Bursary for University Entrance and Continued Support for the past 3 years.

While growing up on the Bruce Peninsula, and attending Bruce Peninsula District School for my elementary and secondary education, I found my passion for the environment and the Bruce. In 2013, I made the decision to attend the University of Guelph to pursue further education and eventually a career in an environmentalrelated field. I am now going into my third year of Honours Environmental Geography, with a double minor in Biology and Geographic Information **Systems** Analysis (GIS). My experience at the University of Guelph has been great, and I have had the ability to take part in many environmental and research-related opportunities. Some of these opportunities include being Environmental Commissioner/Recycling Representative, volunteering with the Environmental Sustainability Office, and working part-time with the University of Guelph VP Office of Research. I hope to broaden my experiences with environmental-related endeavours within my final years at Guelph, and continue my studies to a Master's degree.

Not only am I able to spend my time at University strengthening my knowledge in the environmental field, but my work with Parks Canada at the Bruce Peninsula National Park and Fathom Five National Marine Park has also allowed me to do so. I have been involved with many of the local community groups such as BPEG. Transition Community, BPBA, and the Sources of Knowledge Committee. Over the have gained knowledge, years, Ι encouragement, and support from many of their members, which has given me the motivation to give back to my community. The Sources of Knowledge bursaries for local students have allowed me to pursue a degree in what I am most passionate about, and take my education to the furthest level.
